David Lowenthal and Marquita Riel. Paper. This series of eight reports is the result of research on attitudes toward components of the urban environment, carried out over a six-year period under the auspices of AGS and the Dept. of Landscape Architecture, Harvard University, with the assistance of Resources for the Future, Inc., and the National Institutes of Mental Health. The project elicited public preconceptions and attitudes toward a wide range of environmental stimuli; the reports describe and compare responses to representative milieus in four cities, analyze the relationships among responses to these milieus, and interpret the resulting configurations of environmental traits. The first five papers in the series discuss how the various environments are seen; the last three explore the images of environment held by observers. 1972. **\$100.00**

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### The Americas

1:12,500,000 (1 inch=200 miles); 36x54 inches. General purpose map in ten colors. Water features are in blue, and elevation zones are in green and brown tints. Cities are classified according to population; principal railroads and highways are shown. The specially devised projection (bipolar oblique conic conformal) reduces scale and space distortion to a practical minimum. ### Potential Natural Vegetation of the Conterminous U.S.

A. W. Kuechler. Scale 1:3,168,000 (1 inch=50 miles). 61x40 inches. 116 types of vegetation, grouped into categories of Western forests, Western shrub and grassland, Central and Eastern grasslands, and Eastern forests, are differentiated by color and by symbol, using an Albers equal-area projection. ### World Map

Size, 14 x 14 inches. This Korean map was reproduced from a small atlas ("Under Heaven Map Book") in the AGS Library, now at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. The atlas was published in Korea during the late 17th or early 18th century, but reflects a tradition of religious cosmography probably dating back to the Han Dynasty. Printed on parchment paper, suitable for framing, with an accompanying sheet giving the key and translation of place names found on this ancient depiction of the world. **\$ 15.00**

Scale, 1:5,000,000 (1 inch=80 miles). Miller obliterated stereographic projection system (except Sheet 1B). Each sheet shows land and water physical features (relief is indicated both by contour lines and by layer tints), bathymetry, political boundaries, towns, roads, railroads, airports, and other cultural features. ### Hispanic America

1:1,000,000 (1 inch=15.8 miles). Most sheets measure 34x26 inches and cover 4 degrees latitude by 6 degrees longitude. International and internal boundaries are shown. Population and administrative importance of towns and cities is indicated by symbols and type style. The character of roads and trails, gauge of railroads, limits of navigation for various types of aircraft, airfields, mines, oilfields, etc., are shown. Relief is expressed by contours and layer tints. A relative-reliability diagram on each sheet indicates the types of surveys used in the compilation. The first edition of this classic "Millionth Map," covering the land areas and offshore waters of the Americas south of the United States, was prepared between 1922 and 1945. Many of the sheets have since been updated; the key and list of sheets currently available appears on page 6 and 7.
